"THE WOLF."

Eugene Walter's Drama at Masonic Theater, January 17.

North Bend will be favored with a dramatic treat Saturday evening, January 17, when J. J. Holland offers the great New York success, "The Wolf," by Eugene Walter, at the Masonic Theater.

A graphic story of the Canadian Hudson Bay country, full of color and action, inspiring in its theme, thrilling in its situations and declared to be one of the most perfectly constructed plays on the stage. It depicts life in the locale of the story as it could be depicted only by one intimately acquainted with the passions, impulses and motives which inspire men deep in the heart of nature. It tells the story of a lone girl, of a scheming wolf in the guise of a man, of a hero the type of vigor and strength, and throughout the play there is a tenderness and natural wisdom which speaks volumes.

In "The Wolf" Eugene Walter was the Columbus of a new field of drama. It was brought out after playwrights of all degrees had dipped their pens into vast avenues of exploration, at a time when it was thought there were few more worlds to conquer in the matter of locale, color, atmosphere and theme. There had been a flood of Western dramas, filled with action and the virility of the wild plains and hills, there had been dainty offerings from the drawing room, there had been society plays and problem plays, and search was turning to the other

side, bringing forth brain children from the ingenuity of translators and adapters. At this psychological moment, when the world was crying out for something new, something with a fresh thrill, a different slant on life and the things of life, Eugene Walter wrote "The Wolf."

It was a hit from the moment of its birth.

It remains the most perfect example on record of the possibilities of graphic play-writing.

It is a story of love—the new love sprung to life—the love of baser birth vanquished—the love of a manly man, quick to the defense of innocence, asserting itself in the wooded fastnesses of a fur country.

Hilda McTavish, daughter of Andrew McTavish, a Scotch trader in the Hudson Bay fur country, is a tender, unlearned, gentle girl placed in the great lonesomeness of that region, and more lonesome by reason of the almost maniacal hatred of her father, who has been embittered by the early desertion of his wife and believes that "nae women are guid." Jules Beaubien is a French-Canadian, a handsome, true woodsman who has been visiting at the McTavish home for years, always with ready welcome. Into that picture of native atmosphere comes William McDonald, a railroad engineer, who years before had been responsible for the downfall and death of Beaubien's half-sister. Beaubien, left by his father with the charge to find the half-sister, discovers the fact of her pitiable death and starts out to hunt the man, accompanied by Ba'tiste, his trustworthy friend, a Northwestern Nomad.

They discover, through McDonald's boasting, that he was the betrayer of Annette and that he is trying to deceive Hilda in the same manner. Jules resolves first to take Hilda away from her home and the flight is accomplished after a violent

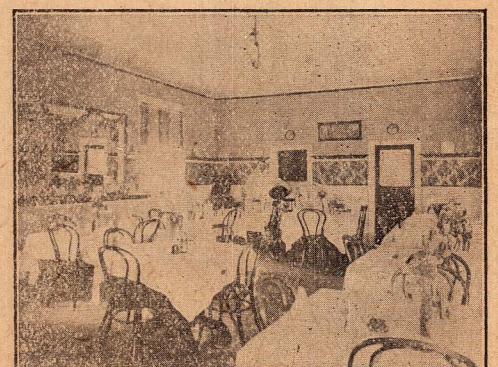

At a meeting of the merchants and business men of North Bend the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, On account of cost increase in all lines of merchandise and labor, necessitating the use of about 40 per cent more capital to do the same amount of business, the grain and hay dealers now shipping with sight draft attached to bill of lading, and the wholesalers and commission merchants reducing the time usually allowed to the retailer: therefore, be it

Resolved, By the following undersigned merchants and business men, that commencing January 1, 1914, all merchandise purchased during any month will be due and payable on the first day of the following month, and, if not paid by the 15th, is delinquent, and no further credit will be granted.

NEW OFFICERS.

H. H. Dano Relected Secretary of the Commercial Club.

Members of the North Bend Commercial Club met at the Eck Theater building Monday evening and elected the following officers and board of directors for the next six months: President, O. E. Vogel; secreiary, H. H. Dano; treasurer, R. E. Williams; directors, S. S. Morris, J. E. Taylor, F. E. Searing and M. J. Willard.

Following are the new bylaws of the Club:

This association shall be known as and entitled the North Bend Commercial Club.

MEMBERSHIP. All applicants for membership must be male voters and membership fee must accompany application.

Regular meetings of the Club shall be held the first and third Mondays of each month, at a place designated by the Chairman of the Executive Board, and shall be called to order by the Chairman at a time specified in the bylaws if a quorum is present. Four members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum, and in the absence of the regular chairman one of the members may be selected to preside.

Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the president. Such call should be made by posting notice in some conspicuous place and should state for what purpose such meeting is called.

OFFICERS.

The elective officers of this club shall be president, who shall also be a member of and act as chairman of the Executive Board; secretary, who shall also be a member of and act as secretary of the executive board; and treasurer, who shall be a member of and act as treasurer of the executive board. In addition to these there shall be elected four members of the executive committee. The seven members thus selected shall be empowered to transact the business of the club at all meetings. They shall be elected by ballot by a majority vote of the members present at the last regular meetings in December and June and assume office at the first regular meetings in January and July of each year.

The appointive officers, if any, shall be appointed by the chairman and their terms shall expire at the same time as the elective officers. Any elective officer failing to qualify the vacancy shall be filled by the executive board. The same provision will apply for filling vacancies caused by death, resignation or removal.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

It shall be the duty of the president

- 1. To preside at all meetings of the club.
- 2. To act as chairman of the executive board.
- 3. To decide all question of order, subject to appeal from his decision to the club.
- 4. To give the casting vote on all questions where there is an equal division except in appeals from decisions, provided, he may be entitled to vote for election of officers and candidates.
- 5. To sign all orders drawn on the treasurer for the payment of such sums of money as may from time to time be voted by the club. To appoint all standing and special committees as the club may prescribe.

It shall be the duty of the secretary,

- 1. To keep a record of the proceedings of the club.
- 2. To read all reports, bills and communications that may be presented to the club.
- 3. To write all communications as directed by the executive board after approval by them.
- 4. To attest all orders drawn on the treasurer for moneys directed to be paid at regular meetings and none others.
- 5. To enroll in a book provided for that purpose the names of the members of the club.
- 6. To fill out membership cards and sign same.
- 7. Generally to perform such other acts as may be required of him by the club.

It shall be the duty of the treasurer,

- 1. To receive from the secretary all moneys of the club and give his receipt therefor.
- 2. To pay all orders drawn upon the funds in his hands, when signed by the president and attested by the secretary.
- 3. To have his books and accounts ready for settlement at the expiration of the term, and attend the club for that purpose when required.
- 4. To deliver to his successor at the expiration of his term, or upon resignation or removal from office, all moneys remaining in his hands, and all books, papers and property of the club.
- 5. To give such security, before entering upon the duties of his office, as the club may require.

MEETINGS.

The regular meetings of the club shall be held the first and third Mondays of each month.

days of each month. Special meetings may be called by the president, as previously provided.

The hour of meeting shall be 8 o'clock p. m. At all meetings four members of the executive board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

DUES.

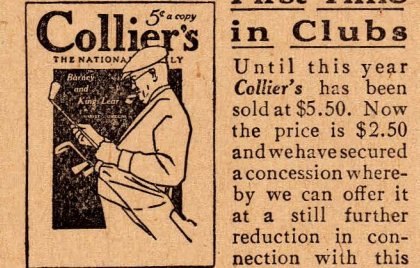
Every member shall pay into the general fund for each semi-annual period 50 cents dues.

Provided, that new members will pay dues from date of nearest semi-annual period after being made a member. Provided, further, that all members in good standing previous to January 1, 1914, will not be required to pay dues before July 1, 1914.

Semi-annual periods begin on January 1 and July 1 of each year.

HISTORY OF EAGLES.

Order Founded at Seattle Sunday,
February 6, 1898.

Seattle Aerie No. 1, Fraternal Order of Eagles, is the Mother Aerie of the entire order now numbering some 1900 subordinate lodges and aggregating a membership of 400,000, was founded in Seattle on Sunday, Feb. 6, 1898.

The founders, nine in number, having a common cause, assembled in Moran's Ship Yard, now owned by the Seattle Dry Dock & Construction Co., and in the course of events while discussing matters of business interests among themselves the thought occurred to organize and thereupon proceeded to launch forth an organization and gave it the name of the Brotherhood of Good Things. A little more than a month later the name was changed to Fraternal Order of Eagles and, the social features while being adhered to, were enlarged upon by adding to it the fraternal and beneficial features now the foundation of the order.

All of the first members of the order were men engaged in the theatrical business and for a short while none but theatrical men were admitted. Among the first nine organizers of the Order that were present at the first meeting who still retain membership in Seattle Aerie No. 1, are John W. Considine of the Sullivan-Considine Theatrical Co., Thomas J. Considine, John Cort, Chester Edwards and Mose Goldsmith.

The change of the name from the Brotherhood of Good Things to the Fraternal Order of Eagles brought with the question if the subordinate body should be called a lodge and emblematic of the bird from whom it took its name the word "Eerie" was used which was afterward changed by John W. Considine

while grand worthy president to "Aerie" and each subordinate body of the order is called an "Aerie."

Shortly after the organization of the order its founders changed their minds on limiting the membership to theatrical men and opened the doors to all those desiring the membership of an order that was willing to help all men irrespective of occupation, believing that there was a craving in the hearts of men for a fraternity that would give all men an opportunity to mingle with his fellowmen. The small beginning then made was the ground work of the magnificent order that now reaches out its helping hand to the needy, that soothes the pillows of the sick and cradles the head of the dying.

Realizing from the growth obtained in the Mother Aerie that other communities would welcome such a fraternity an effort

was made to spread the gospel of Eagledom abroad and on May 28, 1893, Spokane Aerie No. 2 was organized; December 4, 1898, Tacoma Aerie No. 3; December 18, 1898, Portland Aerie No. 4, at Portland, Oregon; February 19, 1899, San Francisco Aerie No. 5, at San Francisco, Cal.; March 3, 1899, Vancouver Aerie No. 6, at Vancouver, B. C.; March 19, 1899: Oakland Aerie No. 7, at Oakland, Calif.; April 2, 1899, San Jose No. 8 at San Jose, Cal.; April 16, 1899, Sacramento No. 9 at Sacramento, Cal.; March 24, 1899, No. 10, at Rossland, B. C.; April 9, 1899, No. 11 at Butte, Mont.; April 9, 1899, No. 12 at Victoria, B. C.; April 16, 1899, No. 13 at Everett, Wash.; April 16, 1899, No. 14 at Great Falls, Mont.; April 16, 1899, No. 15 at Nanaimo, B. C., and so on until the order has reached its present financial and numerical standing.

The first grand Aerie session was held in the city of Seattle May 6, 7, 8 and 9, 1899, and at that time 17 Aeries had been instituted and the total membership of the entire order then was 1785 or a little more than one-half of Seattle Aerie No. 1 today.

The order has grown by leaps and bounds until today it has 400,000 members with net assets aggregating the sum of \$7,501,785.19 and during the same period it has distributed in benefits and relief the sum of \$9,402,046.00.

In dealing with Seattle Aerie No: 1, it being the first Aerie of the order, one must deal with the entire order, but some of the achievements of the Mother Aerie of Eagledom should not be overlooked.

Seattle Aerie now has a membership of over 3300 and assets aggregating \$160,000.00. Among the assets of the Aerie is its own building, erected at a total cost of \$97,000 and which is equipped with modern club house arrangements, such as pool and billiard tables, bowling alleys, library, gymnasium and baths, thereby giving to the person of moderate means the same privileges and benefits of other organizations whose membership is obligated to pay a fee and yearly dues out of the reach of the average man thus making this Aerie a boon to its membership.

One of the proud boasts of the Aerie is the fact that no member whether in good standing or not, has ever been buried in Potter's field.

We care for the living, protect the widow and orphans, and decently bury the dead. Since the inception of the Aerie it has paid out the sum of \$158,018.35 for benefits and relief.
